SPECIALIZED HELP FOR YOUR PET

Family veterinarians see it every day. Up to 75% of their patients suffer from allergy and skin-related conditions. Many of these diseases look very much alike, with only subtle variations in clinical presentation, but great differences in treatment and prognosis. Veterinary dermatologists are trained to recognize these differences and pursue the most direct and cost-effective diagnostic work-up and treatment. That's why family veterinarians like yours and pet owners across North Texas rely on the specialists at the Animal Dermatology Referral Clinic (ADRC).

ADRC doctors are specifically trained to identify problems affecting your pet's skin, mouth, ears, hair and nails. Including:

- allergy and allergy-induced skin diseases
- chronic ear disorders
- infectious skin diseases
- parasitic skin diseases
- skin manifestations of systemic diseases, including endocrine/hormonal imbalance and internal malignancy
- autoimmune skin diseases
- foot, nail and nail bed diseases
- skin tumors, cysts and cancer of the skin



At the Animal Dermatology Referral Clinic, we partner with you and your family veterinarian. Working together, we can create a results-oriented, cost-effective treatment plan specialized for your pet.

PREPARING FOR YOUR PET'S VISIT

Give your pet the most out of a visit to the Animal Dermatology Referral Clinic, by following these simple guidelines:

1. Fax us a copy of your pet's pertinent medical records, to include test results and medication information.
2. Some medications (antihistamines, tranquilizers, steroids and others) interfere with allergy testing. If your pet is currently taking medication, discuss this with our office or your veterinarian to determine whether the medication can be safely and temporarily discontinued prior to your visit. If this is not possible, don't worry. We can discuss other options during your visit.
3. On your first visit, arrive 15 minutes prior to your appointment time. You will be asked to fill out a Client Information Form and Patient History Form. Or, you can download these forms online at www.DermVets.com.
4. If you must cancel your appointment, 24 hours notice is appreciated.
5. Do not bathe or groom your pet prior to your visit.
6. Do not feed your pet the morning of your visit, in case blood work or sedation is needed.



WHEN SHOULD YOUR PET SEE A DERMATOLOGIST?

Pets experiencing skin and ear problems may be reacting to environmental factors, internal stimuli or both. Your pet should be seen by a dermatologist if any of the following symptoms persist or continue to recur:

- hair loss
- repetitive scratching, licking, chewing, biting or rubbing
- skin discoloration
- unusual odor
- crusting
- growths in or under the skin

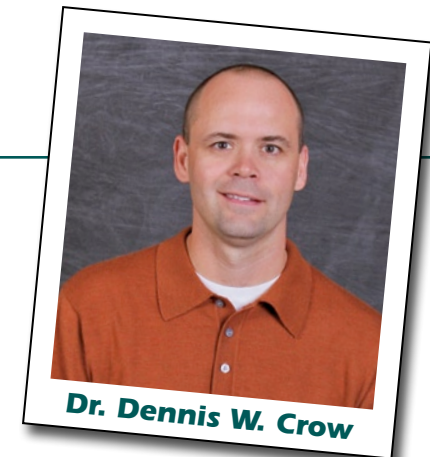

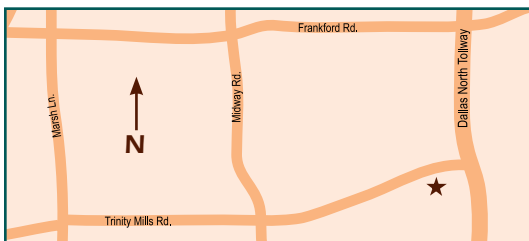
